Holy Week and Easter

Palm Sunday –the weekend when we lose an hour's sleep. Please note that the Palm Sunday service will be at **10.30 British Summer Time**, although it will feel like 9.30 to us! Holy Week. This year the Mission Community will be providing reflective prayer station opportunities in the different churches. St George's is excused from being a host this year as we will still not be completely organised behind the scenes and will be busy planning for the Bishop's visit. Dedication of the new Church Rooms, Consecration of Garden of Remembrance extension

We are delighted that the Bishop of Exeter, the Rt Revd Robert Attwell, is joining us for 3 hours on the early evening of **Thursday 12th April**. The first part of the time will be by invitation, but we will have a Songs of Praise type service at 6.15. or 6.30, and everyone is welcome and invited to this. Come early to get a seat! There will be more details of this in the middle of March. In the meantime, if you have any music or hymns that you think should be sung, or any Bible or other readings that you think are appropriate, please let Chris know of any suggestions by 11th March. Also, at the consecration, which will take place as a separate service before the Songs of Praise, we propose to remember by name those whom we would normally remember at the service of Remembering and Hope. The only names automatically on the list will be those for whom funerals have been held by St George's in the last 2 years. If you wish a loved one's name to be remembered, please pass the name to Chris **in writing before Palm Sunday.**

Outstanding HAP work — there is still quite a bit to be done. It is likely that by Easter the "well" will be capped over and this looks as if it will cost just under £2,000. We need to consider the front roof and north side roof and the possible upgrading of the electrical supply. Many of the details in the February TT still apply. Active consideration is being given to the shed to go behind the church to house garden equipment, paint pots etc. We still need to fit bespoke storage in the store room and generally do more work around the place. However, we are pleased to report that the first phase of storage in the vestry is now complete and we now know where the communion wafers, candlesticks, offertory bags and so on are stored! Thank you to all those who are still working hard on this and how grateful to God we are for all the donations and bequests, especially that of Harold Hayden. The annual report gives some reflections on this.

Facebook. Excerpts from a recent email, in which in the light of recent news, she outlined their **safeguarding policy**. We are aware of many other groups distributing aid on the ground. Many have a reputation for issues in the way they work. We have one specific team on the ground - all have a criminal record check and are referenced more fully than anyone would be in the UK. We are in daily contact with them. We spend many hours planning each project to ensure that we carry them out to the highest standards. We work with small teams from different communities, so we can regulate them better as there is little chance of anyone ignoring anything they feel is inappropriate. All distribution and assessment teams have a 50% female presence. We separate the work into different stages: the team collecting data about people in need have no authority to decide who will receive the aid and we don't distribute to all listed. The team who assess and distribute are not connected to those they are meet and must follow our criteria for assessment and procedures of working. The team who make up the deliveries in the warehouse do not know those who receive each bag. Three employees need to be present at any one time in the warehouse so there is no opportunity for any of them to abuse their access to our aid. Each team works independently the others and help to regulate each other. Almost all our distributions are supervised by an official who is completely independent. Afterwards, we have full lists of all recipients and an independent person contacts a random sample for feedback. It is essential to us that we regulate every aspect of our work closely. Sadly, humanitarian aid has gained a poor reputation on the ground in Syria for many different reasons. We set ourselves apart, and any NGO's on the ground find our way of working laborious and time consuming so prefer not to work with our teams. NB the knitting basket has appeared again at the back of church!
