Samara's Aid Appeal Boxes of Aid were distributed in the area of Deir Ez Zor recently liberated from IS; a very challenging task. "Three containers are being converted to "meditainers". On 4th Feb the World Health Organisation visited the first new hospital project, Al Rahmie which means "Mercy" and pledged support by providing some additional equipment and supplies. We have also been provided with a free building for our team to use alongside our Meditainers by the Ministry of Religion in Syria, for the patients who need to be hospitalised. These are such precious blessings which don't come easily in a place like Syria. We are so thankful! Over the last few days our team have been carrying out practical assessments of local doctors and nurses we have shortlisted, to choose the most appropriate to join our team. It is essential to use as many local qualified doctors and nurses as possible to provide employment for those who will serve their community long term. The 2nd small hospital will be called Al A'adel, "Justice" and the 3rd will be Al Eeman. "Faithfulness"." Please pray for "Dr A" the project director in Syria. He faces huge challenges.

We continue to get to know our new Church Rooms. There is still "snagging" to do and the work has revealed issues that were going to emerge sooner or later. The electricity supply may need updating but for the time being it is safe. However, we have been warned not to use all the overhead heaters at once or else we risk blowing fuses. Modern regulations need to be enforced with regards to fire safety (smoke detectors, emergency lighting and signs) and insulation standards. We have also had to use stronger (and more expensive) electric cabling than anticipated. The roof over the new foyer is in quite a bad state and may last up to 5 years but may not. One of the directors of Cofton Country, (son of Cofton's Church Warden Valerie) arranged for our gutters on the main north roof to be cleared. He had been very grateful to take away some of the stones that had come out of the wall and that were excess to requirements. I have relayed our thanks. However, the first concern is the new water feature. Is it an outside baptistry? A fish pond? I took a phone call from the builders the last week in Jan to hear – "Chris, we have a problem, we can't finish the tarmacking as a sink hole has opened up!" I confess my heart sank along with the hole. They had been applying the first "patching" coat of tarmac and tamping it down when the ground gave way. It had been noted by some that the ground had sunk slightly there, so we just thank God it did not give way when someone was standing on top. You can see the remains of the tarmac patch. It is likely to be an old well as it is under the archway in the stone work over which we have often puzzled. Whatever it is, it needs to be dealt with and we need to take advice. Please do pray for wisdom for the HAP team as we deal with this. The pictures show the site foreman, firstly holding up the pole to show its length, then demonstrating how



far back it goes. The hole itself is about 3'or 4 'deep, (well over a metre), extends under the arch, and the ground at the bottom of the hole is soft. We have dubbed this "St George's Well!



Now for more enjoyable things and we praise God not only for the donors and legatees so far, but for the ongoing generosity. Donations have covered the cost of the loo roll holder, the second kettle, the baby change unit and some of the chairs. Pans for the kitchen, a microwave and

box files for the vestry have been offered. The Celia Trust has covered

the cost of a new flag pole; cheaper than repainting the old one. More mats will appear. Thank you everyone. Hopefully order emerges! Extra expenditure still up for sponsorship: (1) Wall units in flower area: £240; (2) Blinds to the windows and back door, supplied and fitted: £311.84; (3) Fitted storage on vestry wall and insets in stair well: @ £1,500; (4) upgrade to kitchen @ £1,500; (5) new desk for vestry £50. We will also need new noticeboards; mirrors; wall cupboard for WC; back door mat; work top savers for



the kitchen work surface. Over the next few weeks you will see gradual changes and will be things we haven't thought of yet! Remember Fair Trade and Plastic **Reduction**; let's work towards phasing out single use plastic, including glitter (!) and use refillable bottles for cleaning materials.
