THY KINGDOM COME

Will Halse writes:

Linda has a gift for using practical aids to help us respond to her sermons. These have included a piece of cloth to represent something we were giving up to God. We each brought our cloth forward and laid it on the Communion table. On Good Friday we were given two sticks



to make a cross; and then she told us to break them, remembering how Jesus was broken, and how he died for us. Then on Easter Sunday we lit a candle from the Easter candle during Communion to receive the light of Christ for ourselves.

On the fourth Sunday in Easter (April 21st) Linda baptised Charlie Parsons in our Greg's@10 service. She invited us to write words of prayer for Charlie on small coloured wooden bricks. And then we brought them forward and together we built a wall of prayer for him. That was such a good picture of prayer. It was simple – just a few words. It was something we each did as individuals. It was something we did together. What words can we pray? Few words and simple when we are alone. What words can we say when we pray together? Few words, simple words. Can we step out in faith and lay our prayers before God?

Those of us who were in St. Greg's for Linda's first Greg's@10 service will remember that she spoke about her return to DEVON – and she used each letter to stand for an important part of her vision for our church life. The N was the most memorable for me, probably because it came with a bit of a twist – it was N for Pray. How does that work? Well we **N**eed to Pray! You have probably worked out where I am going. If we haven't got a prayer we sure need one!

We are approaching Ascension Day, 40 days after Easter Sunday. It falls on May 9th this year. It's a public holiday in Finland. Do come to our special Ascension Day service at St. Greg's at 7 pm. Pentecost Sunday is the birthday of the church and will be ten days later, on May 19th. Each year since 2016 there has been a Worldwide call to pray under the banner 'Thy Kingdom Come', words from the Lord's prayer. This began very simply - in the ten days from Ascension Day until Pentecost we are all encouraged to pray for five people we know to come to know Jesus. So let's pray for five.

But under the banner of Thy Kingdom Come there are many more things that we can pray for. So let's do that, too. Let's make an extra effort to pray 'Thy Kingdom come' for those ten days. We can do this at home, or when we are out walking; at work or at rest. We can pray alone or with

others, in a church, in a pub, in a shop, on Zoom or on the phone. In simple faith and with simple words let's pray 'Thy Kingdom come' between Ascension Day and Pentecost in this year of our Lord Jesus 2024.

As part of 'Thy Kingdom Come' there will be a 'phone in' each day for this Mission Community. At **12noon from Fri 10th May up to and including Sat 18th May, just phone 01200 480091** to join in with saying the Lord's Prayer together.

"ALL SHALL BE WELL AND ALL SHALL BE WELL AND ALL MANNER OF THING SHALL BE WELL"

Helen Bays writes:

This is probably the best known saying of Julian of Norwich whose festival we celebrate on 8th May. This was the date in 1373 when aged around 30 and mortally ill, the woman who came to be known as Mother Julian, experienced a series of 'shewings' of Christ crucified.



We know little of Julian's earlier life, her family or even her name, but we do know that after this profound experience, she recovered her health. In time she became an anchoress, living for the rest of her life in a cell within the church of St Julian in Norwich, from which she took the name by which we know her. She spent many years reflecting on the sixteen shewings and eventually wrote about them in two editions of 'Revelations of Divine Love'. This is the first book known to be written by a woman in English and has become a spiritual classic. In recent years it has been translated from the original middle English into modern language, so we are able to read for ourselves Julian's insights into God's love revealed by Christ on the Cross, in which, through all suffering, she found deep joy.

Her reconstructed cell has become a centre for prayer and 'Julian groups' have spread throughout the world. Ours is not affiliated to the organisation, but in our monthly meetings, we follow their pattern of an opening prayer and reading (often but not always taken from Julian's writings), followed by a period of silence before a closing prayer. It is a simple format but we all find that, counter-intuitive though it might seem, it is easier to enter into deep silence in the company of others than in our own at home where we can be too easily distracted.

We meet in St Gregory's at 2pm on the 4th Tuesday of each month (next meeting 28th May) and welcome people from across the benefice or beyond. On Wednesday 8th May, we will also celebrate the festival of Julian of Norwich at the midweek Communion in St Gregory's at 10am.

DAWLISH COMMUNITY LARDER

ROC (Redeeming Our Communities) Dawlish runs Dawlish Community Larder in support of local individuals and families struggling with food poverty through the cost-of-living crisis. In the two years from January 2022 we directly helped 2,000 local people in need, by providing emergency food and groceries, and provided



surplus food to thousands more through our waste food deliveries to local schools.

We currently have a crowdfunding campaign, which runs until early June to seek funding for a community food waste coordinator. Aviva Insurance will match fund any donation made, pound for pound, up to a maximum of £250, so if you give £10, Aviva give £10 of their own money; if you give £100, Aviva match it with £100 - you get the idea. THE 'DEATHLY SILENCE': HOW TO BE A VOICE FOR NATURE'S VOICELESS

Sunday 5th May is 'Rogation Sunday'. Hannah Eves (Policy and Campaigns Manager at A Rocha UK) takes a timely look at how churches can respond to the biodiversity crisis:



Experts are warning of a 'deathly silence' falling over the natural world as species numbers continue to plummet. As a soundscape recordist, Bernie Krause has been recording the sounds of the natural world for over 30 years. He has noticed changes in the density and variety of natural sounds, but in April last year his recordings unearthed something chilling – silence. The sound of nature had been snuffed out. It's what experts are calling the 'deathly silence'. Scientists who work with ecoacoustics are saying that silence is falling across thousands of habitats as we experience an unprecedented loss of species. It's something you may not notice until it's gone: the humming of insects, bird songs and calls and the snuffle of mammals moving through undergrowth. When we talk about the biodiversity crisis we don't always think about the *sound* of nature, but without urgent intervention we risk losing more and more of our natural world, and more and more of the sounds of the British countryside.

The UK is one of the most nature-depleted parts of the world. Just 3% of land and 8% of sea in England is well protected. The latest *State of Nature* report, published in Autumn 2023, showed that approaching one in six UK wildlife species are at risk of extinction. In 2019 it was one in ten. Despite this, targets to restore nature have been missed. In 2020, the UK met just three out of ten global targets for nature recovery. We had gone backwards on six targets. In 2022, the UK government committed to halt the loss of wildlife and manage 30% of land and sea for nature by 2030. But these commitments have not always been backed up by urgent action and losing the sounds of nature is just another example of not enough being done to protect the natural world. It's easy to feel discouraged at the scale of the problem. What on earth can we, as Christians, do in the face of a 'deathly silence'? Actually, more than you might think. We can begin by creating a home for nature in the land around our churches and by speaking up to remind politicians of their obligation to meet international commitments on nature restoration.

Church land has huge scope to help nature. Collectively churches are one of the UK's largest landowners. Across Christian denominations total church land holdings in the UK easily exceed 200,000 acres. The Church of England is estimated to hold about 75,000 acres within dioceses, including churchyards, glebe land and burial grounds. The Church Commissioners have an additional 100,000 acres including 17,000 acres of woodland. From bats in belfries and swifts in vestries, to the flowers and insects living in church burial yards, the land around our churches is nature's home. We can begin to restore the nature around our churches by engaging with the Eco Church award scheme.

And we can speak up. As nature falls silent, we can voice our indignation at this injustice, speaking up for God's creation and calling for better from our political leaders. Without urgent action we are looking at a future devoid of the natural world's hum, buzz, tweet and song. Nature needs our next general election to be a turning point. That's why, through the Nature 2030 campaign, we're calling on all political parties to put nature at the heart of their manifesto. *The campaign's next step is to make an unprecedented noise for nature. We'll be taking the key asks of the campaign on to the streets of London on 22nd June to demonstrate the public support for nature restoration and hope to bring more information on that to you in a subsequent newsletter.*
