Benefice E-Newsletter Dawlish with Holcombe and Cofton 10th December 2023



Happy second week of Advent to you and hope your preparations are going well, both spiritual and secular. Only two more weeks after this to the celebrations.

Now for a confession (it's good for the soul). I am an arctophile - for the uninitiated, that is a collector of teddy bears. (See, you learn something new every day.) I know, I'm a sad case, but I can't resist them. My favourite I have had for 73 years on Christmas Day and he still has pride of place in my collection of bears, even though he is a little like

me, rather battered and a bit bald in places. But he represents the happiness that children feel, when opening their presents on Christmas Day. Sadly, many children in this country and across the world do not always get these happy experiences now, that many of us had in our childhood.

My teddy also represents several customs which my family had established over the years and suddenly ended with my grandmother's death at the beginning of December, when I was eleven. Nothing was ever the same after that in spite of the efforts of the adults. But like so many customs, over the years they develop into others. And when I sat down to write this letter on what would have been the anniversary of my grandmother's death and subsequently my father, I realised that over the years I had established customs and traditions with my ever-increasing family. But, due to circumstances they have now all changed and new customs will be developed. And it is the same with so many families... In a moment, one's life can be changed forever whether for the good or for the bad. Will, last week wrote of how the anniversary of the death of his baby grandson has now been a focus of something more positive and rewarding for his family.

The seasons of Advent and Christmas do seem to have a number of traditions attached to them and we have long established traditions here... Take Advent as an example - I can remember when Advent services were more gloomy than Lent. No hint of carols, until the crib service, no school Carol concerts. The huge Christmas tree, delivered to St. Gregory's from the Luscombe estate could only be put up on Christmas Eve along with all the flower decorations and the crib. The Carol service was after Christmas when most people were heartly fed up with it all!





But, Alleluia, it is so different now. We let the children in to practice and perform their Christmas celebrations. On Wednesday the Funeral Directors held what has become a tradition, the ecumenical service of carols and readings that enables families to remember their departed and share memories, whilst experiencing again the love from God in their grief.

At St. Mary's on 21st will be a service for the longest night, where anyone who feels overwhelmed by all the Christmas celebrations can come to a much quieter, reflective service of readings, prayers and two carols, whilst remembering loved ones. This service seems to have also become a part of our advent traditions. A real joy now, is the Christmas Tree Festival. A chance to fling the church doors wide and welcome people in to discover our church communities and a maybe get a sense of the real meaning of Christmas. And who can resist a beautifully decorated, sparkly Christmas Tree.

Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of the Son of God; we ought to be happier about it, and show how glad we are to receive this precious gift of love from God. If we are not happy and excited about our preparations for Christ's Birthday, how can we expect those who do not have any faith to even begin to want to understand. Will suggested going carol singing before Christmas. That was something we used to do but mainly around the pubs better pickings from them for the charities we were supporting! It is a great idea, and a way of proclaiming the message of Christmas.



I wanted to buy a pack of Christmas cards from a well-known supermarket this week and was disappointed to find that not a single card had even the slighted hint of the true



meaning of Christmas. It could be-'polar bears sledging day', or 'rabbits playing in the snow day', but not Christ's Birthday. I wanted to shout out: 'Where is Christ in your Christmas' – 'Do you understand what this time is really about?' But I didn't fancy being arrested for being an idiot. And that is a sad reflection on me, that I was not brave enough to challenge the lack of the truth of Christmas. Maybe we should have more courage and speak up for our Lord at this time.

But sadly there is one thing that has not changed over the centuries and that is the level of poverty in the world. One tradition that tells us Christmas is coming, is the endless variations on the troubles of Mr. Scrooge, whether traditional, musical or the muppet version, the theme is the same. The hardship of so many families, and the callous disregard from the rich. But this is one area we can help. Until a few years ago it was the custom at the Crib service to have a collection of toys for Dr. Barnardo's, until they announced they were not receiving any more toys. It was our way of doing something to help bring some joy to the children. There is still a great need for help as the level of poverty increases and the donations to the food banks are desperately needed as the demand grows. It is one way we can show our





love for our neighbour. Perhaps with the tins of soup and packets of pasta we can add some Christmas treats for these families.

Despite being the story of the birth of a king, at the heart of the nativity are people who are marginalised and outcast. A young girl, Mary, chosen to give birth to the Son of God. Humble shepherds invited to be amongst the first to meet the new king. And Jesus himself, who was born in squalid conditions and soon became a refugee. Nothing Has Changed.

Thank you for reading results of my rambling thoughts and I hope that whatever family traditions to share this Christmas they will bring happiness to you all. Enjoy your Advent, rejoice at Christmas and give thanks for the gift of Christ from our loving God.
