#### Beyond the Daffodils – some thoughts on Mothering Sunday

As we were reminded by Alan in St Gregory's last week, Sundays don't count strictly in the 40 days of Lent. However, to exclude them can seem very much like cheating (sorry, Alan!) After all, it really shouldn't be too difficult to go without chocolate or wine or whatever you might have given up for 6 days at a time. However, when it comes to this Sunday, there should be no argument.

From medieval times, the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent has been marked as Laetare (rejoicing) or Refreshment Sunday. The custom grew in those earlier centuries of letting young servants and apprentices go back to their mother church (the one in which they had been baptised) and to visit their own mothers with gifts of flowers and

Simnel cake. Hence the more modern designation of Mothering Sunday, now marked also as Mothers' Day, especially beloved of hard-pressed card sellers, florists and

restauranteurs. Of course, it is absolutely right and proper to take the opportunity to thank our mothers, but the day can also be hard for those who grieve for lost relationships or whose hopes of parenthood have been dashed. So, it might be helpful to remember that our focus in church is much broader.

> The very title of Mothering Sunday indicates that we are moved to give thanks, not just for our mothers (whether birth, foster, adopted or step) but also for every way in



which we have been 'mothered', by relationships that have been lifegiving and nurturing. To me, this is something a bit different from just a good friendship. I was blessed with a wonderful mother but she died when I had only just turned 21. In the subsequent years, I experienced wonderful supportive love from other older women, who all feature in my thanks on Mothering Sunday.



As we remember the mothering that we have both received and given, hopefully we can also reflect on how the love of God has come to us through those relationships, opening our minds to an image of God as both Father and Mother of us all with all the breadth and depth of relationship that offers.

May Refreshment Sunday bring new impetus to us as we continue on our Lenten journey.
