So here it is Merry Christmas'

Christmas songs are like brussels sprouts: they only appear in December and you either love or loathe them - but either way they are an inevitable component of the festive season. Like distant relatives bounding into family homes at Christmas, every December sees a flurry of festive favourites flood back onto radio, t.v. and phone playlists. I have been reflecting on them and what they bring to mind in the last days of 2023. Will we be echoing the Andy Williams 1963 song:

'It's the most wonderful time of the year'?

Or Wizzard's 2013 song 'I wish it could be Christmas everyday'?



Or will we find ourselves asking the challenging questions of other perennial seasonal songs like **'So this is Christmas and what have you done?'** John Lennon's 1971 song 'Happy Christmas' which was written as a protest about the Vietnam War. Or perhaps hearing in our earpieces, Band Aid's 1984 cry of '**Do they know it's Christmas'**?

In the words of my particular favourite, Slade's 1973 hit:

'So here it is Merry Christmas'

The last cards are delivered by the postal staff. Retail staff close their shops for a wellearned day off, no more presents can be bought before the BIG day. At last, it is time for the Christians and churches to celebrate Christmas. Hang on, haven't we already had our Christmas Tree Festival, our carol services, school carol services and concerts, and much more?

It is easy for us to become weary of Christmas about half-way through December and to realise that many of us struggle to keep Advent very well, if at all. As we rush around buying last minute gifts, sending cards and putting up decorations, it is easy to forget that in the church's calendar the Christmas season only starts as the sun sets on Christmas Eve. Then our crib services are held and



communion services are prepared, only then our churches lose the Advent colour purple for the white and gold of celebration for Christmas.



Churches and families all have their Christmas traditions that are cherished and work well for them, but I am aware that it has become increasingly difficult for many to keep Advent well and instead some wait for the coming of a Christmas that will not be immediately filled with hope and joy.

The church's Christmas season runs through to Epiphany on 6th January, although most of us will have already overindulged long before then. I usually find that even before New Year's Day, I yearn for some 'ordinary' food that lacks

the rich flavours and endless quantities I have had for some days.

It is easy for us to miss the key days in the church's calendar in these last December days between Christmas and Epiphany: St Stephens Day (26th), St John's Day (27th), The Holy

Innocents (28th) Thomas Becket (29th) Some of them are difficult days for us to stop, remember and acknowledge as they point to much pain that has been borne by others as part of the church's tradition and faith story. It's really tough just



after Christmas Day, to mark the first Christian martyr (Stephen-Acts 7), or the murder of Archbishop Becket or Herod's slaughter of infants (Matthew 2).

However, perhaps these are a salutary reminder that this Christmas many will not enjoy the warmth safety and over-indulgence that some of us will. Many locally will struggle to make



ends meet, or be suffering with illness or bereavement. Across the world, we know only too well of those placesnot least Bethlehem itself- where to have any celebration at all will be close to miraculous.

So may each of us at least pause in these coming days to give thanks for the privileges of the Christmas that we have, and to ask as we approach Epiphany how we might match the generosity of the Wise men in sharing what we have.

As my favourite Christmas song echoes in my ears it will

then be a time for us to:

'Look to the future, it's only just begun'

On behalf of all who lead and enable the life and worship in our benefice Churches I offer our prayers and hopes for you all to know something of joy hope and celebration of the Christ of Christ..... mas.
