## TALKING JESUS Steve Cronin writes:

Recently, several people from the Benefice attended a conference held at Hope Church. The conference was run by The Evangelical Alliance and Hope Together (different from Hope Church), the conference was called 'Talking Jesus'. It looked, in an exciting way, at the information gathered during recent research of the current trends in people coming to church - many people coming to church for the first time. As ever it's people's stories that leave an impression when you go to these things. One story that has stayed with me, was about an elderly lady in Iran.



There is an organisation, based in the UK, that ships bibles to Iran. Their most prolific distributer is an elderly lady, who is not very mobile and has difficulties both seeing and hearing. The amount of bibles that she wanted for distribution far outweighed their other contacts and so they asked if she still needed to receive so many. She said yes that she DID need them. They were intrigued, how was this lady able to pass on so many bibles? They asked her.............

She said that each day she gets her shopping trolley and fills it with bibles and goes to the bus stop. When the bus comes, she gets on and as Iranian buses are segregated, sits in a seat where women are allowed to do so. She gets out her bible and asks the woman sitting next to her to read it to her, explaining that her own eyes aren't too good. Invariably the woman sitting next to her will oblige and start to read. Then the elderly lady will ask her newly met companion whether she could speak louder as her hearing isn't too good either.

The woman is effectively reading the bible to the whole bus! This generally causes a stir. "What is this she is reading?" people ask. The elderly lady replies "It's the bible". The other bus passengers react with wonder, and they ask where they might be able to get a bible so they can read it, too. Surprise, surprise! The elderly lady opens her shopping bag and gives bibles to any that want one. A fantastic true story, especially if you consider that to distribute bibles in Iran is illegal and could possibly end in the death penalty to whoever might be caught doing it. It must take real courage to do this every day.

The 'Finding Jesus' research in 2024 took a sample of 280 people who had come to faith in the previous 5 years. It asked questions about how they had come to their decision and what were the significant factors that influenced them. The sample had people aged from 18 right up to people in their 80s. 27%, the largest cohort of the sample were Anglicans.

When asked what sparked their journey the top answers were:

- I needed help with life
- I was looking for meaning
- A difficult or painful experience
- I wanted to be a better person.

The second most significant factors were the actions or deeds of Christians they know:

- 29% A Christian spoke to me about their faith
- 29% Seeing the impact of Christian faith on someone I know
  - 26% the actions of a Christian

Surprisingly a significant number of the people asked said that they were happy to be invited to church. Have we got the courage to start that conversation and invite someone to church?



# A REPORT ON 'REACHING DAWLISH 7'

'Reaching Dawlish 7' was held on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> November in the Dawlish Methodist Church Hall. 46 people attended and a team drawn from across the churches hosted, cooked together and served everyone. It really was a very powerful and deeply encouraging time together. Updates were given from a wide range



of current Dawlish-based mission, outreach and evangelism initiatives, including the ROC Dawlish Schools' Project (Adam Gidney), Dawlish Community Larder and CAP Money Course (Jo Jones), St Greg's Messy Church and Kids' Swap Shop (Ceri Lee), CAP Teignbridge (Tim Wigley), The Hub Store (Simon Dunn), Dawlish Methodist Church Warm Welcome (Naomi Merrall), Hope Cafe (Mike Atkinson), Hope Friends (Margie Laing), and Rockhaven Adventure (Roger Helyar). Needs were shared and offers of help were given. If you'd like to find out more about any of these initiatives, please just ask and we'll seek to link you up with the relevant person.

Mark spoke briefly from Jeremiah 29:7, reminding us that, just as the exiles in Babylon were told to "seek the peace and prosperity" of their community (Jeremiah 29:7), we too are called to engage fully where God has placed us. To advance the Kingdom further we must all work together — churches, ministries, and believers united.

During an open time of prayer, the Holy Spirit moved powerfully, and we felt the Lord speak to us directly about the priority of working in unity and love as his disciples, and about our shining as lights as we go out into our community. The children were great at asking thoughtful questions and enjoyed being challenged to think differently. This coming half-term we have plenty of Christmas themed classes to access and we will be running our Christmas puppet show for EYFS (Early Years Foundation Stage).

We also led many assemblies, covering 'Forgiveness Day', 'Harvest' and what it means to have a 'Fresh beginning'. We now look forward to Advent, Christmas and some more Catholic flavoured assemblies.

an afternoon of quiet prayer at St George's Church, Holcombe on Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2-4pm


