LIONS, LAMBS, LEOPARDS AND BEARS, OH MY! Ceri Lee writes:

In preparing to lead Greg's@10 this coming Sunday (7th December) I spent time reading quite a few commentaries and reflections on the set readings for the day before deciding which way to go. I settled on Matthew's account of John the Baptist (Matt.3:1-12) BUT couldn't get the Old Testament reading (Isaiah 11:1-10) out of my mind. Here's an extract from it:

One of the reasons for the passage remaining on my mind is undoubtedly because its well-known words are a beautiful and profound prophecy concerning the future reign of the Messiah. Another reason is because I came across a reflection on the passage by Corenna Rae which resonated with me. After 25 years in her role as a vocational minister (in Rhode Island in the United States) Corenna describes herself as continuing to 'learn how to listen well and walk vulnerably' as she endeavours to empower people to become confident, vulnerable, generous, Christ-like leaders. Her lifetime passions, she goes on, are for ministries of justice, reconciliation, restoration, and healing. She's not the only one. I dare say a few of us share her fervour for those ideals! Here are some of the thoughts Corenna shared on the Isaiah passage, and which made an impression on me:

'Perhaps you have seen or heard of the videos, reels and pictures that not so long ago appeared on the internet, of a tiger nursing piglets or a sea lion hugging a penguin. Even though they've been proved to be generated by AI and, therefore, are false, we are still fascinated with such things, because they are so rare. If every tiger took care of piglets, it would not be noteworthy. In the same way, the parade of animal friends in Isaiah is remarkable because of its oddity: wolf and lamb, leopard with kid, calf with lion, even children who play without fear because snakes don't bite. Peace, Isaiah tells us, is possible when inconceivable, not only for odd animal friendships but in our lives. In fact, this vision grows out of something that appears finished, lifeless, and discarded.

The sign of new life to come begins with a stump. There may be times when we look around and think our relationships are finished or that the world is more divided than ever. Yet generations before us, facing similar fear, violence and apprehension, have chosen to say "yes" to the invitation to move toward righteousness and reconciliation, as Isaiah envisioned here. Like the stump, this invitation has deep roots. We are reminded of the history of God's people and God's transforming presence in our world. This ancient text recalls the reality of the human condition and its possibilities. In so doing, it encourages us to remove any barriers to equity, to transformation, and to honouring our collective humanity. Friends, there is life here and new possibilities every day!'

Isaiah tells us that prey will no longer fear their predators. The vulnerable will be protected. All of creation will be filled with the wisdom of God. We have reason to live joyfully together – let's do it!


