What's it all about?

Bunnies, lambs, chicks? - the signs of new life?

Easter eggs? That often don't even say Easter on them?

Oh maybe I'm getting old?



I can recall Easter Eggs that you used to unwrap, and they came in two halves with something in the middle, usually a bag of sweets! Nowadays it seems the sweets are proudly displayed within the packaging and the egg must be smashed to be eaten, with nothing inside it.

Whilst I think it takes away the surprise element of what sweets might be inside the egg, maybe it is a better illustration of the Easter story and the true meaning of Easter?

If we use the analogy of the Easter egg as the tomb, then there shouldn't be anything inside it, because when they went to the tomb on the first Easter morning, it was EMPTY – no Jesus! Well, that was a surprise!! Jesus wasn't in the tomb He was out and about, alive again for all to see!!!

Mary stood outside the tomb weeping. As she wept, she knelt to look into the tomb and saw two angels sitting there, dressed in white, one at the head, the other at the foot of where Jesus' body had been laid.

They said to her, "Woman, why do you weep?" "They took my Master," she said, "and I don't know where they put him."

After she said this, she turned away and saw Jesus standing there. But she didn't recognize him.

SAFEGUARDING — a trainee's experience! David Quy from St George's writes:

It is, perhaps, only human nature not to be too enthusiastic about venturing out on a cold Monday evening in March, replete after a satisfying evening meal washed down with a diet tonic water! That is especially true if the incentive is to attend a small gathering to digest the Church of England's BASIC safeguarding course - obligatory for those of us who have certain well-defined responsibilities and duties at our respective churches. Approximately two-and-a-half hours later when we were homeward-bound, I think I speak for everyone in saying that our feelings were completely different - *and much more positive*.

This being our first session, our training started at the BASIC level and covered a plethora of safeguarding topics across the age ranges, reminding us that - potentially - anyone can be affected by such issues. Through a series of scenarios - cast from an iPad onto a television screen - we learnt to recognise, respond, record and refer matters and concerns to the appropriate person, usually our safeguarding officer. We were given a number of scenarios and had to select our answers from a series of multiple-choice questions. We were told that we had acquitted ourselves admirably, achieving 100%!

It was really good to spend the evening with a group of friends and fellow Christians, just like being in a house group in fact, with everyone feeling able to express their opinions openly and in complete confidence. We should like to thank Tess for inviting us to her home for such a beneficial and thought-provoking evening and for the warmth of her hospitality (tea or coffee and chocolate digestives) and for her unobtrusive and helpful guidance. After an evening well spent, the journey home was undoubtedly a much more positive and satisfying experience for us all.

The annual APCM will be taking place on Sunday 11th May after the morning service. Each year we elect 4 new PCC members to serve for 3 years and 2 wardens who will serve for 1 year. Nominations need to be submitted before the meeting with a proposer and seconder for each candidate. Forms will be available in the Narthex after Easter. These cannot be done electronically!

In the meantime perhaps you could think about whether this is a way you could serve the church. Meetings are held once every other month and thanks to modern technology reports can be circulated before to cut down on the meeting times. We therefore usually finish within 1½ hours.

It is your chance to have a say on what happens at St Gregory's, being involved in major and minor decisions running the building and events, how money is spent and which projects are tackled first. No previous knowledge of committees, business or finance is required. The only qualification you need is to on the electoral roll, which is a reminder that if you haven't already handed in your renewal form get it done.

TURN OUTDOOR SPACE INTO A GARDEN SINK (a mini "rain forest"?)

Ever wondered what your outdoor space can do for the climate and local wildlife? Try these top tips.
Move over No-Mow-May! - Let areas of your garden grow long this summer to create amazing habitats for wildlife. Longer grass equals longer roots, which can increase soil carbon storage.
Make space for nature – Create valuable habitats for small creatures including insects by making deadwood piles, dead hedges, and leaf piles.

3. **Go Peat-Free** –Capture carbon and garden nutrients by making your own compost. Make sure that any bought compost is peat free. (*Damaged peat bogs release greenhouse gasses. CC*)

4. **Use Mulch** – Did you know that many native plants referred to as "weeds" are vitally important for our wildlife! Disturbing the soil to dig out weeds will release buried carbon stores, so if removal is necessary, use mulch to suppress them.

5. **Grow your own** – Cut your shopping bill and connect with nature by growing your own fruit and veg this year. If you are stuck for space, why not try vertical growing?

And....don't get rid of moss!!! More about this another time, but for now—half a square meter of moss can absorb a kilogram of carbon dioxide a year. It is also an important habitat! CC
